

Recipe for May

Crockpot Orange Chicken

Ingredients:

- 2 large carrots, peeled and sliced about 1/2-inch thick
- 2 large red or green bell peppers, cut into 1/2-inch chunks
- 3 cloves garlic, finely minced
- 4 boneless skinless chicken breasts
- 2 tsp. ground ginger
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- · 8 ounces orange juice concentrate
- 2 cups Mandarin orange segments or fresh orange segments
- 2 Green onions, chopped
- · Hot cooked rice

Directions:

Put carrots, peppers, garlic, then the chicken, ginger, salt, pepper & frozen orange juice in Crockpot. Cover and cook on LOW 4 to 6 hours. Serve chicken on hot cooked rice on platter. Top with orange segments and green onions. Serve chicken liquid in gravy boat, if desired.

Ford Announces Alan Mulally Retiring on July 1; Mark Fields Named Company President and CEO

Ford Motor Company [NYSE: F] announced today that Alan Mulally has decided to retire from the company July 1, and Mark Fields will be named Ford president and chief executive officer and elected as a member of the company's board of directors.

"From the first day we discussed Ford's transformation eight years ago, Alan and I agreed that developing the next generation of leaders and ensuring an orderly CEO succession were among our highest priorities," Executive Chairman Bill Ford said. "Mark has transformed several of our operations around the world into much stronger businesses during his 25 years at Ford. Now, Mark is ready to lead our company into the future as CEO."

Mulally, 68, is retiring after nearly eight years leading Ford and capping a remarkable 45-year career. Mulally has led Ford's transformation and strengthened its position as one of the world's leading global automakers. Under Mulally and the company's One Ford plan for profitable growth, Ford has achieved 19 consecutive quarters of profitability, developed the strongest product lineup in Ford's history

and embarked upon the company's most ambitious global expansion in the past half century.



"Alan deservedly will be long remembered for engineering one of the most successful business turnarounds in history," Bill Ford said. "Under Alan's leadership, Ford not only survived the global economic crisis, it emerged as one of the world's strongest auto companies. We always will be grateful to Alan for his leadership, compelling vision and for fostering a culture of working together that will serve our company for decades to come."

The transition in July is approximately six months earlier than previously anticipated, following Mulally's recommendation to accelerate the timetable based on the readiness of Ford's leadership team.

"Alan and I feel strongly that Mark and the entire leadership team are absolutely ready to lead Ford forward, and now is the time to begin the transition," said Bill Ford, who recruited Mulally from Boeing in 2006.

Fields, 53, was named Ford's chief operating officer in December 2012. He has been leading all of Ford's global business operations and most skill teams, including product development, manufacturing, purchasing, and marketing, sales and service.

Fields' role as COO has included leading the company's weekly Business Plan Review meeting, which Mulally established to track the progress of the One Ford plan and to monitor the global business and competitive environment. The Thursday meetings are credited with driving a reliable and transparent process for running Ford's global operations and enabling Ford's senior leadership to work closely together and act decisively on its plan.

Before serving as COO, Fields served as executive vice president and president – The Americas since October 2005. There, he led the transformation of Ford's North American business – turning it from record losses several years ago to record profits in each of the last four years. Earlier, Fields guided the product-led transformation of Ford's European operations and formerly held European luxury brands, as well as the relaunch of Ford's independent operations in Argentina and a major restructuring and product renaissance at Mazda. Mulally thanked the Ford team for their many contributions and accomplishments.

"It has been an honor to serve and contribute to creating a viable, profitably growing company for the good of everyone associated with the Ford Motor Company," Mulally said. "By working together with all of our stakeholders around the world, we now are accelerating Henry Ford's original vision to open the highways to all mankind.

"Ford's future is so bright, and Mark – supported by an experienced and dedicated senior leadership team – is absolutely the right leader to continue to deliver on our compelling vision," Mulally added.

Fields underscored his commitment to the One Ford plan, including building on the company's unprecedented global introduction of new products, innovations and excellence.

"It is a true honor to lead this great company and this talented team into the future," Fields said. "Under Alan's leadership, we have seen the power of One Ford and what a culture of positive leadership and working together can accomplish. My commitment is to build on that success by accelerating our pace of progress. All of us at Ford are committed to delivering even more of the great products and innovations that will deliver growth and define our company going forward."

Another Hot New Mustang Test Model Spied

Hey, we're not going to start speculating on this Mustang test model captured cruising in Michigan ... we're just going to suggest that you enjoy the view.

Why? Well, because we simply really don't know what to make of it.

A report by Autoblog suggests it could be a new SVO model, but even the AOL auto source seems to just be throwing the idea out there as pure speculation. What's certain is that while the model captured in the photos looks very similar to the GT500 seen before, there are a few noticeable differences.

The most apparent is the rear exhaust and the sound of the models when accelerating.

Unlike the GT500 spotted earlier that featured quad exhaust outlets, two of the four pipes have been capped off on this model.

EDITION mustangs



1969 Limited Edition 600

The Limited Edition 600 was a promotional unit developed by the Philadelphia sales district in May-June of 1969. The 600 consisted of special order, custom colored Mustangs in either "Flower Power Red" or "Groovy Green." This promotion was only available on hardtops or sportsroofs. Only 503 of Limited Edition 600s were produced. The Limited Edition 600 promotion coincided with Ford's national "Mustang Stampede" sales promotion. All 600s will be identified by the absence of a color code and a DSO of 16 plus 2783 through 2788 number on the door data plate. Most but not all 600s were powered by six cylinder engines, largest available was the 351-2v.



1968 Gold Nugget Special
The Gold Nugget Special is an interesting Mustang sold out of the Seattle District Sales Office in 1968. These Sunlit Yellow Mustangs totaled 525 and had unique golden plaques on the dashboard with the original owners names engraved. Along with the special yellow paint all recieved the louvered hood with black stripes. All GNS Mustangs have the DSO (74) plus four digits "1111" as well as the color code "Y".

Ford's 2015 Mustang Takes Europe by Storm

Last Saturday was the first day that European drivers could place their orders for the all-new Mustang from Ford Motor Co. (NYSE: F). Ford even offers the new Mustang with a right-hand drive option for the United Kingdom. This marks the first time in the 50-year history of the Ford Mustang that it will be available for sale in Europe.

Ford received 9,300 applications for the first 500 Mustangs that will be available in Europe. The company launched its promotion for the Mustang at the start of the Champions League soccer final match and took 500 orders for the car in the first 30 seconds of the game.

Prices for the car have not been announced, but an entry-level Mustang is rumored to cost in the neighborhood of £30,000 (about \$50,500). The United Kingdom is slated to receive 130 of the 500 Mustangs in the first batch going to Europe. The cars will be built in the United States and shipped to Europe.


The entry-level Mustang is expected to be priced competitively with the Nissan 370Z and well below such high-end competition as Porsche, BMW and Audi, among others.

The Mustang and the recently introduced all-new 2015 version of the F-150 pickups are among the 16 new car launches the company plans for 2014.

The introduction of the Mustang into Europe is part of Ford's strategy to go after higher-end buyers. The company is also dressing up some of its existing European models with leather seats and other enhancements that Ford hopes will appeal to more — and more well-heeled — buyers.

IHS Automotive has said that Ford's European sales could rise by 25% to 1.65 million units by 2020. The wildly successful launch of the new Mustang must be encouraging for the company's hopes.







A Paper Pony

JONATHAN BRAND has vivid memories of the moment the engine hoist broke. In an instant, a 500-pound V-8, freshly extracted from the 1969 Ford Mustang he was restoring, fell and pinned him between the floor and wall of his parents' garage. Remarkably, he was not hurt.

The incident remained ever-present, though. A decade later, Mr. Brand, an artist and sculptor, reimagined the experience of rebuilding that Mustang by rendering a full-scale paper sculpture of the car, including a finely detailed replica of the 302-cubic-inch engine that could have killed him.

- Working from photos and recollections of his own Mustang, Mr. Brand first made computer drawings of the car's individual parts using illustration and 3-D modeling









programs, and then made printouts on a large-format inkjet printer. He cut, folded and glued the paper sheets together, building them up into larger components, which were finally joined into a finished work of art.

- The parts have no underlying framework for support; the heavy paper, like the sheet metal used in real cars, gains strength once it is pressed or folded into shape, Mr. Brand explained.
- The engine replica is obviously much lighter than the 500-pound V-8 of the original. The aftermarket valve covers, with their finned surface and raised Ford logo, were more difficult to make than the car's original, plain-finish parts.
- Mr. Brand said the spark plugs were the most intricate parts in the project. Using tweezers, he made four of the eight; each required 12 hours.
- The Mustang's badges and logos, including the trademark galloping horse in the grille, are the only printed photographs on the car.
- In his artist's statement, Mr. Brand said, "I figure out why I'm doing something while I'm doing it, let the accidents and the difficulties along the way lead me to the finished object."
- Ms. Conley with Mr. Brand. Just as an auto hobbyist spending long hours restoring a car might do, Mr. Brand credits an understanding spouse for support with the project.
- Mr. Brand's paper Mustang caught the attention of the Ford Motor Company, which hosted him and his father for the Detroit auto show in January.
- Internet exposure for "One Piece At A Time" has generated inquiries from Mustang buffs as well. "I've received more than a dozen requests for the plans for the car or the engine," Mr. Brand said. "I can't imagine anyone wanting to do this in their spare time.
