SALSA SALAD



"Chunks of avocado, tomato, red and green peppers, and plenty of cilantro give flavor to this refreshing and colorful salad, and jalapeno peppers give it a hint of heat. Dressing is just a simple squeeze of lime juice."

Ingredients

- 4 large ripe tomatoes, cut into bite-size pieces
- 1 bunch cilantro, stems cut off and leaves coarsely chopped
- 1 large green bell pepper, cut into bite-size pieces
- 1 large red bell pepper, cut into bite-size pieces
- 2 jalapeno peppers, finely chopped
- 3 green onions, chopped
- 1/2 sweet red onion, chopped
- 2 large avocados, pitted and cut into bite-sized pieces
- 1 lime, juiced
- 1/2 teaspoon salt, or to taste

Directions

In a large salad bowl, lightly mix the tomatoes, cilantro, green and red bell peppers, jalapeno peppers, green onions, and sweet red onion until thoroughly combined. Gently toss with avocado pieces, and squeeze lime juice over the salad. Sprinkle with salt to serve.

Footnote

Control heat of the jalapeno peppers by leaving in membranes and seeds (hotter) or removing the seeds and membranes (milder).

DETAILING TIPS AND TRICKS

Some of you know that I have been looking for a way to share my knowledge of vehicle detailing. I have decided to start a monthly column dealing with the tips and tricks that I have learned over the years. Hopefully this will catch on and I will be getting questions from you, the readers, to answer each month.

This month I would like to start with Modern Techno-Jargon. In today's highly competitive world of car care, ongoing research and development are a given. Wash, polish and protection products are now highly engineered, and manufacturers often coin "scientific" words or phrases to describe and market their latest technologies to consumers-sometimes with confusing results. Here are some of the more popular terms:

Nanotechnology: No one major manufacturer has a corner on nanotechnology. Although they may call their processes by different names, virtually all of today's leading car care companies engineer their compounds on a molecular level. Nano refers to particles one-billionth of a meter or less in size. Nanotechnology allows washes, waxes, polymers, and other chemical agents to more effectively penetrate and/or treat minute surface imperfections. "Nanotech" can also strengthen the bonding of surface protection to create a tighter barrier against the elements.

Hydrophobic Technology: This term describes products that enhance water repellency and "hydro-protection." Waxes and polymers can be designed to fend off liquids either through sheeting action (like dishwasher detergents often do to prevent water spotting on glassware) or through beading properties. Consumers, however, have come to associate beading with shine and product longevity, so many manufacturers opt for that more visual form of hydro-protection.

Waterless Car Care: This category can include everything from spray products designed to lift light dust and quickshine a car between washings and waxing to steam cleaning machines. In fact, in many municipalities, car owners are now limited to bucket washing their vehicles, while professional detailers are required to use portable basins to catch and reclaim water during washes. Some non-traditional companies are beginning to tout steam machines as an ideal way to comply with such ordinances-although the jury is still out among professionals as to how safe high-temperature steam blasts are for clear coat surfaces.

Green-Friendly Solutions: Again, this is a catchall phrase with a variety of meanings. Examples include low-sudsing or biodegradable formulations, non-toxic solutions, allorganic or natural compounds and, of course, waterless technologies.

Well, that is all for this month; please check back next month as I will start with the basics of detaining our ehicles....




FABULOUS FORDS A DAY IN THE SUN TO CELEBRATE THE BLUE OVAL

FORD MUSTANG TROUBLESHOOTING GUIDE AND TIPS

We've Got The Answers For Typical (and Non-So-Typical)

Mustang Malfunctions

ENGINE RUNS ROUGH

- Carburetor choke sticking (flooding with rich mixture).
- Idle-air mixture bleed(s) plugged or out of adjustment.
- Intake manifold vacuum leak-gasket, carburetor spacer, vacuum hose
- 1: Manifold vacuum should be 15-22 inches at idle.
- 2: Spray carburetor cleaner around suspected vacuum leak area. If engine surges, you've found the vacuum leak. If engine operation does not change, keep searching.
- 3: Vacuum leaks at carburetor base and spacer are typically due to warpage or defective gaskets. Check surfaces with a straight edge. A machine shop can mill these surfaces to get them true.
 - 4: Flaws in carburetor castings can cause vacuum leaks.
 - 5: Throttle shaft vacuum leak worn shaft and bushings.
- 6: Vacuum leak at automatic choke.
- 7: Manifold gasket leakage. If underneath, engine oil is drawn into intake ports, which will cause blue or white exhaust smoke. This typically happens with engine rebuilds where heads and block decks have been milled, which creates manifold vacuum leaks.
- 8: A faulty PCV (or hose) valve can cause an irregular vacuum leak and rough operation.
- 9: Ruptured vacuum modulator at transmission (C4, C6, and FMX). Not only causes a vacuum leak, but fluid loss from the transmission because fluid is drawn into the engine intake and burned, also causing smoke from the exhaust.

ONE OF A KIND 2012 MUSTANG



When you turn 100, it's pretty much guaranteed Willard Scott will Photoshop your face onto what is seemingly the label of a jar of jam and give a birthday shout-out. But when it's 100 years of naval aviation we're talking about? Jam is a no-go. But an extraordinary car created for the occasion? That'll do.

To pay tribute to the centennial, engineering and design teams at Ford crafted this unique 2012 Ford Mustang, inspired by the U.S. Navy's Blue Angels naval aviation demonstration team and the F-18 Hornet aircraft it flies. The GT's exterior features a custom spoiler with vertical tailfins, Screaming Yellow gloss accents and Blue Angels script and crest from the Navy aircraft. Creations n' Chrome did the chrome blue paint, and we're sorry to say you can only drool over it for now – it's unlike anything available on any production vehicle in the world.

Inside, the Mustang has the Blue Angels crest stitched into the leather Recaro racing seats and offset stripes that give a hint of pilot flight suits. There are cluster graphics, performance gauges and instrument panel appliqués, too. Other notables are the Blue Angels script on the illuminated sill plates and puddle lamps that project jet images when the doors open.

The Mustang also has a Ford Racing supercharged 5.0-liter V8 engine that makes a whopping 624 horsepower, plus a Ford Racing handling pack, performance exhaust and racetrack brakes.

On July 28th, the Blue Angels Mustang was sold at the Gathering of Eagles charity auction during the Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) AirVenture Oshkosh, an event that took place July 25-31 at Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. The auction brought home a final bid of \$400,000, making up a good chunk of the total \$2.2 million raised at the annual EAA AirVenture benefiting the Young Eagles program. Ford is the exclusive automotive partner and longtime supporter of EAA.

All proceeds from the car donation and sale will benefit the EAA Young Eagles organization, which has provided free introductory flights to more than 1.6 million young people since 1992 while also teaching the value of hard work, personal responsibility and enhanced math and science skills. The Gathering of Eagles annually draws more than 1,000 aviation enthusiasts in support of Young Eagles and other EAA programs that inspire young people to become engineers, aviators, astronauts, scientists and innovators.

The Blue Angels edition joins three other one-of-a-kind Mustangs created by the Ford design and engineering teams for the EAA Young Eagles auction in recent years. Ford vehicles sold at auction during past EAA AirVenture events have collectively raised more than \$1.3 million to support Young Eagles

NEW RUMORS ON THE 2015/2015 MUSTANG

When the month of April 2014 comes around, the <u>Ford Mustang</u> will turn 50 years old. Many expect Ford to unveil a new Mustang to celebrate the golden anniversary of America's longest running car. The 2014 Mustang is expected to offer a total redesign of the Mustang line - the first since 2005 - and there is <u>massive speculation</u> around just what to expect. We have heard discussions of an EcoBoost Mustang and rumors suggest that the "next Mustang" in 2014 will be more of a globally friendly vehicle, being smaller in stature than the current Mustang and more closely related to the original 1964.5 Mustang.

Unfortunately, if reports from Motor Authority are correct, the next major redesign may not come until the 2015 model year. Ford introduced the very first Mustang in April of 1964 as a 1964 model year vehicle, but when you consider how a company makes "next year's models" well ahead of the end of the current model year, Ford would have to look closely at how they would officially roll out the new model. If they were to celebrate the first viewing of the Mustang in April of 1964, it would most likely be a 2015 model year vehicle, unless Ford waited until the middle of the 1964 calendar year to unveil the 2014 model.

Based on that speculation, the next generation of the Ford Mustang could come as a 2015 model year vehicle on April 17th, 2014. That would make its grand debut 50 years to the day when the first Mustang met the world. In the meantime, Ford still has the 2012, 2013 and 2014 model year Mustangs to worry about.



Along with the report that the next redesign won't come until 2015, the Motor Authority also reports that one of the key items tiding us over until the new Mustang will be the Shelby GT500. The GT500 has long been the most powerful factory-built car in the muscle car world, but with the introduction of the 2012 Camaro ZL1 - expected to have between 550-580hp - the GT500 will have its first real competition.

There has been speculation that the GT500 will transition from being supercharged to being turbocharged, but the recent rumors suggest that Ford's SVT group will stick with the supercharger to boost the power up around the 600hp range. This would once again put the Mustang on top of the horsepower hill in the muscle car segment, and this beefed up GT500 could hit the market as soon as the 2013 calendar year...most likely as a 2014 model year Mustang.

Along with gobs more power, the GT500 may also be the next recipient in the segment of an advanced, adjustable suspension system. General Motors has equipped the Camaro ZL1 with the same magnetic ride control system that is featured in the Corvette ZR1 and for the 2012 model year, Dodge has fitted the Challenger SRT8 with a dual mode suspension system designed to optimize handling capabilities without sacrificing daily driving comfort.




