## 1972 Ford Mustang Sprint Convertible Is an American Red, White, and Blue Gem



Look hard enough, and you might still find some yesteryear Ford Mustangs with the Sprint package up for grabs. Chances are most (if not all) of them will come either as hardtops or SportsRoofs. Not the one we have here, though. You're looking at a convertible with the Sprint package.

Born back in the early days of the Blue Oval muscle car, the Sprint package was designed to appeal to the patriotic nature of the Americans. It blended the all-too-familiar Wimbledon White paint with the colors of the American flag, strategically placed all over the body. Other than that, Sprint also brought to the table the American shield on the rear fenders.

As said, most of these cars came as hardtops or SportsRoofs, but a run of 50 convertibles designed like this were made in 1972. The goal was to have them take part in the Cherry Blossom Parade Festival in Washington D.C. in April of that year.

The Mustang you see here is one of those 50. Having survived the passage of time, not in small part thanks to restoration work, the claims to its lineage are backed by factory paperwork, the original window sticker, and the warranty plate card manual.

This particular example is powered by a 302ci (5.0-liter) engine that was rated at just 140 hp and 239 lb-ft (323 Nm) of torque back in its day. The engine continues to run through an automatic transmission.

We dug this particular car up as we were looking for worthy ones to be featured in our Mustang Month coverage this May. It sits on the lot of cars that are going under the Mecum hammer this week in Indianapolis.

The sellers of the 1972 Ford Mustang Sprint Convertible, as it's listed, are expecting it to fetch between \$75,000 and \$85,000.

## Purple People-Eater: The 1970 Mustang Milano

Ford Motor Company wowed the crowds on the 1970 auto show circuit with this far-out Mustang hatchback concept.



First displayed at the Chicago Auto Show in February 1970 at the International Amphitheatre, the Mustang Milano was one of a fleet of five Fords specially customized for the car show circuit that year. And while it never reached production, the Milano did foreshadow some significant future Mustang features—including the hatchback roof.

Based on a production 1970 Mustang body shell but with radically different lines, the Milano was just 43 inches tall, seven inches lower than a standard showroom Sportsroof. The low roofline and radically laid-back windshield—67 degrees—created an almost bullet-like overall silhouette.

To our eyes, the squared-off nose bears a strong resemblance to the '69-'70 Shelby Mustang front snout, and to the production '71-'73 Mustang nose as well. Ford press releases called the flamboyant paint color "Ultra Violet," setting it off with a leather interior with high-back bucket seats in bold lavender and contrasting rainbow stripes. A set of matching luggage, also in lavender leather, stowed in the rear compartment.

The Milano's giant tail lamps boasted a novel three-color warning system: Under acceleration the lamps glowed green, turned amber while coasting, and lit up in red like conventional brake lamps when stopping. The cast-aluminum lace wheels with wire-wheel motif remind us of the once-popular Appliance Wheels aftermarket pieces that were introduced around that same time, and they rode on specially constructed Firestone F60x15 tires with raised white letters.

According to the Ford press materials, "The uniquely styled rear deck lid, complete with built in air spoiler, is similar to tailgates on some European station wagons. Hinged at the top, the deck lid and backlite open electrically just above the taillights to provide generous accessibility to the rear luggage compartment." So it seems Ford had the hatchback concept down pat—just not the term "hatchback." Here the rear hatch area is large enough to swallow up two fashion models, not nearly as roomy as the handy but smaller cargo space on the 1974 Mustang II hatchback. We don't know what became of the Milano but as with so many Motor City show cars, it is presumed destroyed.



## Best Used Mustangs To Buy Right Now



If you're a Mustang enthusiast on a budget, you don't have to sacrifice your dream car. In fact, there are so many Mustangs for sale out there, it can be hard to know which offers the best bang for your buck. Whether you're looking for a classic '65 coupe or a modern GT, these cars will give you good value for your money.

#### 5. 2015-2017 MUSTANG GT

The fifth item on the list is the 2015-2017 Mustang GT. These cars are a little more expensive because they're newer, but you get the Gen 2 Coyote engine with 435 hp. The IRS suspension is a massive upgrade in performance, and it's also great for the track. With a few well-chosen mods, you can add even more power to an S550. These cars are usually available in the high teens, but you can find them as cheap as \$16,000 to \$17,000.

#### 4. 2007-2009 MUSTANG GT500

The 2007-2009 Mustang GT500 is my fourth pick. You can get a 2020+ Shelby GT500 for around \$100,000 if it's not in the best condition. However, you can find the 2007 model for only \$20,000 to \$22,000.

2007-2009 Shelby GT500s come with a 5.4-liter 500-horsepower supercharged engine, backed by a TR-6060 six-speed transmission. These features are worth every penny and can be improved even further. By throwing an extra thousand dollars of mods into it, you can increase the horsepower from 500 to 600 easily.

There's always an air of exclusivity that comes with owning a Shelby Mustang. You won't get quite the same performance level as the modern GT500s, but the performance you get for the price makes this car an excellent value.

#### 3. 1996-1998 MUSTANG COBRA

Number three on my list is the 1996-1998 Mustang Cobra. These cars are nowhere near as fast as the Coyotes, but they still have a 4.6-liter V8 engine with a T45 five-speed transmission. These Mustangs are leaner and lighter than their modern counterparts, which makes them a lot more fun to drive. And again, it's a Mustang Cobra, so there's the cool factor of owning one.

You can find a '96-'98 Mustang Cobra in the \$5,000 to \$6,000 range, which is cheaper than getting a supercharger for your Coyote. They're excellent bang-for-the-buck streetcars that can be a really enjoyable project.



## 2. 1967-1970 MUSTANG COUPE

The 1967-1970 Mustang Coupe is the second on my list. Regarding vintage cars, the classic Mustang Coupe gives you a lot for your money. While Mustang convertibles are expensive, the coupes can still be bought at \$6,000 to \$7,000.

As far as performance goes, the engines from that era aren't as strong compared to today's standards. However, the V8 Mustangs are affordable and easy to upgrade. Also, you get that sweet vintage style and the joy of driving a classic car. It's a great way to get your foot into the classic car market and a good value for your money.



## 1. 2011-2014 MUSTANG GT

The 2011-2014 Mustang GT is my top pick for a number of reasons. It marks the debut of the Coyote engine, which knocked out an impressive 412 horsepower in its early years (later model years saw that figure upped to 420hp).

You can find a Mustang GT from 2011-2014 for around \$13,000 to \$14,000, which is an amazing price for such a good looking car. A lot of these Mustangs come with modifications already done to them, saving you money you might have spent in the future. These cars have great stock performance and can be modified easily to enhance performance even more. All these reasons make the 2011-2014 Mustang GT the best value.
