THE SCENE

Ford Mustangs 57th Birthday





The 1970 Mustang Sidewinder Special was one of many territory specials created during the first generation of Mustang. While most of the territory specials debuted in the late '60s and were aesthetic packages, the 1970 Sidewinder has the shape of a Boss mustang, and from a distance might be mistaken for one.

Though you may have expected the Sidewinder Special to be an Arizona or Nevada special, those being the states where you can find a sidewinder rattlesnake, it was actually a Nebraska/lowa special.

Ford offers very little in the way of information regarding the brief and relatively undistinguished history of the Sidewinder Special. According to AmCarGuide.com, Ford produced only 40 of these vehicles, and only seven remain in existence today. The vehicle was noted for its distinctive


stripe kit that included a snake-on-wheels decal on the rear panel.

The Result Of A Special Ford Promotion

The available information indicates the Mustang Sidewinder Special was actually intended to be a promotional vehicle. According to Ponysite.de, dealers could order the Sidewinder using a special manufacturer's code. Standard Sidewinder features included a 351 4V engine, sportsroof, comp suspension and the Ford automatic transmission known as Cruise-o-Matic. Ford built the vehicles in Dearborn and shipped them to the dealers with the stripe kit packed in the trunk, to be mounted by the dealer's body men.

With only seven remaining, the Sidewinder Special is without a doubt one of the rarest Mustangs.





The 1960s were a time that would provide some of America's most iconic muscle cars, this helped to spark a cultural revolution in the car community among younger car enthusiasts. The Mustang could be regarded as the world's first pony car and some even credit it for starting this muscle car mania. Within the first year, the Mustang managed to crank out over 500,000 sales and it has continued the trend of outselling the competition ever since. This constant over-achievement has led to a cult following of the classic pony car from the beginning and today we mark the 57th birthday of our beloved American legend.


Our story begins in the year 1964 when Henry Ford II unveiled the first generation Mustang at the World's Fair in New York. Like many of our favorite muscle cars, this instant classic was named after a fighter jet. The jet in question is the P-51 Mustang Fighter used in WWII, this seemed like a perfect fit as it was an integral part of the American fighting spirit.

Surprisingly, the original design was meant to depict a two-seater mid-engine roaster similar to the Corvette. However, thankfully, this design was scrapped and the four-seater front-engine V8 was allowed to begin stealing the hearts of car lovers everywhere.

Now, after over 50 years and 6 generations, the Mustang is as athletic as ever utilizing its 5.0-liter V8 Coyote engine to become one of America's most powerful muscle cars. The Mustang line is also entering the EV market this year with the Mach-E — a car pulling the Tesla fans to the pony emblem.

While others, such as the Camaro, try and fail to keep the Mustang stays true to what it has always been. The Mustang was first thought of as a lightweight version of a muscle car with better handling while still retaining the incredible engineering prowess that made American cars so great in the first place. Even today there is a massive following behind the Ford Mustang and it only seems to be growing by the minute.





The 1974 Ford Mustang Ghia was one of the first of what would be many collaborations between Ford and the legendary Italian design house Carrozzeria Ghia. The Mustang Ghia was a noble attempt to put a luxurious spin on the otherwise austere Mustang II. While not a performance powerhouse like the pony cars of the '60s, the Mustang Ghia was an interesting attempt to redefine what the Mustang was in the wake of the gas crisis of the early '70s.

HISTORY

To understand the Mustang Ghia, it is necessary to understand the Mustang II. With sales of the first generation Mustang steadily declining from 1966 onwards, Ford began to sense that a change was necessary. The 1973 gas crisis had consumers opting for smaller cars — especially Asian and European imports — and Ford responded by offering up a smaller, more fuel-efficient Mustang based on the Pinto platform. Though the Mustang II is frequently put down now, at the time it was both a critical and commercial success, winning the coveted Motor Trend Car of the Year award.

THE MUSTANG GHIA

Ford had already tried a luxury model in the first generation,

a trim called the Mustang Grande. With its success and the strong sales of the Mustang II, the idea of another luxury Mustang made financial sense. Ford had recently bought a majority share in Ghia and drew upon that company's expertise to create a luxury option for its new pony car.

The original 1974 Mustang Ghia was available as a two-door coupe and featured a vinyl roof, spoke-style wheel covers, upgraded sound, shag(!) carpeting, wood-colored accents, and a host of other upgrades. The Ghia model was available as a luxury package throughout the production run of the Mustang II. Even after Ford moved to the Fox body platform, the Ghia name stuck around and continued to be offered in 1979, 1980 and 1981.

GHIA IN EUROPE

While today the Mustang Ghia may seem like a quaint piece of Ford history, the two companies had a much longer association in Europe. Until 2010 Ford offered many of its most popular models in Ghia trim. To this day, the company continues to contribute its design expertise to some of Ford's most exciting concept cars.





I Finally Drove This 1966 Ford Mustang After Storing It For 9 Years. Now My Other Cars Seem Dull



I'm feeling a bit weird right now. Yesterday I finally drove a 1966 Ford Mustang that I'd bought as a gift for my brother back in 2012, and have been storing ever since. The experience was so invigorating that I don't know if I can ever look at my Jeep collection the same way.

Maybe this is just the newness of a fresh relationship tugging at my emotions, but my god, I can still feel my heart beat a few rpm higher than usual. After bleeding and adjusting the drum brakes all morning (and tracking down dastardly leaks), I spent the afternoon yesterday for the first time a 1966 Ford Mustang that I've technically owned since 2012. The experience was incredible. (Okay, to be fair, I did limp the Mustang a few miles to a car show back in 2012, and I tried driving it down the block in 2014. Both times, the machine died).

The sound of those 289 cubic-inches squeezing burned combustion gasses through a big hole in the car's exhaust pipe; the sight of that beautiful, long, bright red hood and awesome vintage gauges; the acceleration. Yes, I said it, this thing feels quick!

The problem is that none of my other cars — not the 360 V8-powered 1979 Jeep Cherokee Golden Eagle, not the 1991 Jeep Cherokee 4.0 five-speed, not the "Holy Grail" 1994 Jeep Grand Cherokee 4.0 five-speed, not the 1992 Jeep Cherokee 4.0 automatic, not the 2000 Jeep Cherokee 4.0 automatic, and definitely not the 258 inline-six powered 1985 Jeep J10 — feel quick at all. Relative to the Mustang, they feel downright lethargic!

And it's not even because they are actually any slower. I bet that five-speed Jeep Cherokee XJ can accelerate as quickly as the Mustang to 60 mph. But the Jeep sure as hell doesn't feel like as eager, and that's because the Cherokee — like every other car I own except maybe that diesel manual Chrysler minivan that my parents are storing at their house in Germany — sound downright boring!

None of the AMC inline-sixes or even that 360 V8 have even remotely interesting aural outputs. When I step out of that Mustang and jump into any of my other vehicles, it immediately hits me that something

really important to the automotive experience is missing. It's that sweet, sweet V8 bark.

I feel like I just entered a hot, steamy new relationship, and now I'm talking about neglecting all of my friends to hang out with the exciting, attractive new thing in my life. But have no fear: This will not happen. The Mustang can try to lure me in with its Candy Apple Red paint and that great sounding motor, but my other vehicles have a simpler charm that I can still appreciate.

My J10, for example, has a bench seat. How awesome is that? Also, it's a manual, which is great. And heck, it's four-wheel drive with manual locking hubs. Plus it has a giant bed, which I can use for practical things like hauling Changlis from shipping ports to homes of prolific automotive bloggers.

My Cherokee XJs are handsome in their own right, and incredibly capable off-road. My manual Grand Cherokee feels downright refined, and my Golden Eagle? I think, with a bit of buffing, I can make it look just as pretty as that Mustang.

That's right, Ford Mustang. You will not be a siren, leading me to ditch my long-time automotive friends. They've been good to me, mostly.





As we reported back in February, the very first production 2021 Ford Bronco and 2021 Ford Mustang Mach 1 VIN 001 were all set to cross the block at Barrett-Jackson's flagship Scottsdale auction, with all of the proceeds from the sale of those vehicles going to charity. The first 2021 Ford Bronco subsequently sold for a whopping \$1.075 million, as we reported yesterday, but 2021 Ford Mustang Mach 1 VIN 001 hammered for an also-impressive \$500,000.

All of the proceeds from the sale of the first 2021 Ford Mustang Mach 1 will benefit the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation to research cures for kids with diabetes, adding to the \$70 million Ford has raised during its 35-year partnership with the charitable organization. Meanwhile, proceeds from the sale of the first 2021 Bronco will benefit the National Forest Foundation and Outward Bound, which are part of Ford's Bronco Wild Fund.

"Two of Ford's most iconic vehicles, the Ford Bronco and the

Mustang Mach 1, were reborn for 2021 in response to great public demand," said Dave Pericak, Director Enterprise Product Line Management – Ford Icons. "To celebrate their return, we donated the coveted VIN 001 of each to raise money for key non-profit organizations. Bidding was fierce for these vehicles because it was a rare opportunity for the public to own a very special Ford and help charities that have a lasting impact on society. We are very pleased that Ford Motor Company helped raise \$1,575,000 for these worthy causes."

The 2021 Mach 1 marks the return of the legendary Mustang model following a 17-year hiatus. 2021 Mach 1 VIN 001 is equipped with the optional Handling Package and Tremec six-speed manual transmission and is finished in Fighter Jet Gray, a color exclusive to the new Mach 1. Meanwhile, as we reported last month, Mach 1 deliveries are underway as examples are rolling off the assembly line at the Ford Flat Rock Assembly Plant.



Ford Performance Teases All-New NASCAR Next Gen Mustang For Global Mustang Week; Race Car Debuts May 5th

Ford and NASCAR look to the future next season, welcoming the Next Gen era with an all-new Mustang race car from Ford Performance that will compete in the NASCAR Cup Series starting in February 2022.


Race fans and Mustang enthusiasts will get their first chance to see the NASCAR Next Gen Mustang on May 5 at its public unveiling. Until then, Ford Performance shares this taste of the car's first laps around historic Martinsville Speedway, accompanied by the thunderous soundtrack of a powerful Roush Yates Ford V8 racing engine.

"We couldn't be more excited to show off the NASCAR Next Gen Mustang to Mustang enthusiasts and Ford race fans around the world," said Mark Rushbrook, global director, Ford Performance Motorsports. "This is truly a game-changing redesign for the sport of NASCAR, and we expect everyone is going to love the result of the countless hours of work by those of us at Ford Performance and our partners in NASCAR. Mustang Week is the perfect opportunity to showcase a guick tease of this exciting new race car."


Ford and NASCAR have spent thousands of hours designing the new body. Development continues at Ford's racing center in Charlotte, North Carolina, using the same simulation and design equipment that's used to design all-new vehicles, like Mustang Mach-E.

To date, Mustang has 31 wins in the NASCAR Cup Series since becoming Ford's flagship model for the series in 2019, and is coming off a 2020 campaign that saw it win a season-high 18 races and capture the manufacturers' championship for Ford.

2021 marks the sixth straight year of Mustang's reign as the world's best-selling sports coupe.


