

How Ford Managed To Keep The 2024 Mustang Under Wraps Until Its Debut



Debuts don't get much bigger than the unveiling of an all-new Mustang, but that presented Ford with a serious problem – how to keep the redesigned pony car under wraps?

Ford knows the challenges all too well as the highly-anticipated Bronco lineup leaked like a sieve. As you may recall, pictures of the Bronco and Bronco Sport surfaced months before their official unveiling, much to the chagrin of the automaker.

Eager to avoid a repeat, Ford went to great lengths to keep the 2024 Mustang a secret. This was no easy task as a countless number of people were exposed to the car, ahead of its big debut on September 14th.

In order to limit exposure as much as possible, the model was extensively camouflaged and this disguise wasn't limited to the street. As Flat Rock Assembly employee Maria Cunningham explained, even pre-production prototypes were camouflaged as they were being built. Needless to say, this helped to discourage employees from snapping a picture and spoiling the secret.

While pictures did eventually leak out early, the most revealing ones didn't surface until hours before the Mustang's unveiling. That was unfortunate, but it's impressive Ford was able to keep the secret for so long.

Now, with the wraps off, we know the seventh-generation Mustang is a proud pony that sports chiseled bodywork and an evolutionary design. Buyers will also find a high-tech interior that features a 12.4-inch digital instrument cluster and an available 13.2-inch infotainment system.

However, Ford isn't done keeping secrets as performance specifications remain a mystery. So far, the automaker has only confirmed there will be an all-new, turbocharged 2.3-liter EcoBoost four-cylinder and a fourth-generation 5.0-liter Coyote V8. They'll be joined by a new Dark Horse variant, which is slated to have an upgraded version of the V8 producing around 500 hp (373 kW / 507 PS).

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Thanks for all your support



Media outlets who are less in the trenches were a bit surprised to discover that there would be no hybrid, all-wheel-drive, or electric variant of the S650 Ford Mustang upon its reveal at the 2022 Detroit Auto Show. But that's not to say that those ideas weren't explored, some even expected a hybrid to show up during the S550 generation. So, why is there no hybrid Mustang? And is there a need for another electric Mustang? The answer may surprise you, and it has everything to do with the success of the Mach-E electric crossover SUV.

In conversation with The Detroit Bureau, Ford Spokesman Mike Levine put the definitive stamp on the project by saying "There is no hybrid Mustang."

It certainly doesn't get any more black and white than that, but why did the blue oval decide to abandon the hybrid after announcing that it was working on the project in 2017? Well, that brings us to the Mustang Mach-E.

After Jim Farley took the reins as CEO, he became a strong voice that pushed the company towards developing an electric crossover with sporty tendencies that would meet California's new strict emissions mandate. In other words: a compliance car. But a good one.

The move ended up being the right one, as the Mach-E has been a strong seller for Ford, even eclipsing Mustang coupe sales in some months. It's allowed Ford to leave the beloved formula of the Mustang coupe alone, giving a product for the more die-hard muscle car enthusiasts to rally around. Perhaps the only product for them to rally around.

Dodge is about to plunge into electrification, previewed by the Charger Daytona Banshee EV concept and its "exhaust" sound, which has drawn mixed reception. Chevrolet, as MC&T first reported, will withdraw the Camaro nameplate after the 2024 model year. The next big change for the Mustang's powertrain will likely happen for the 8th generation model and will involve ditching internal combustion completely in favor of electrons. But that won't happen until the end of the decade, at the earliest.

Thieves steal Ford Mustangs, again, from the Flat Rock Assembly Plant

Thieves also stole several Jeep Wagoneers the same night.

Car thefts continue to plague Ford, with thieves getting away with over a dozen Mustangs last week. It's the latest in a string of brazen larcenies that have targeted automakers in recent months.

Thieves stole 12 to 15 new Mustangs around 2 a.m. on September 13, and police have recovered two so far, according to Fox 2 Detroit. The incident happened at Ford's Flat Rock Assembly Plant in Woodhaven, Michigan. This is the third reported theft from the factory that produces the Mustang.


Woodhaven Deputy Police Chief Jeffrey Brust told Fox 2 that he does not believe these incidents are isolated events. He told the news station that he thinks that the thieves are working in teams and know where to find easy targets.

Thieves have also targeted the Ford F-150 Raptor. In June, police recovered 13 Raptors that had been stolen from Ford's Dearborn Truck Plant. Not only did police find the vehicles damaged, but some were reportedly in various states of disassembly. In July, thieves attempted to steal more Raptors, but police quickly responded. Officers pursued one of the vehicles, arresting several people and recovering the truck and a stolen Ford Mustang Shelby GT500.

Surprisingly, Ford wasn't the only automaker targeted on September 13. In Warren, Michigan, thieves stole at least two Jeep Wagoneers; however, police believe they are looking for at least five or six stolen vehicles. Police were able to find the two, but the suspects got away.

The Flat Rock Assembly Plant experienced its first theft in December 2021. Thieves used one Ford Mustang Shelby GT500 to ram a security gate, allowing thieves to take three other GT500s without damaging them. Police recovered two of the vehicles that night.

In late August, police arrested juveniles caught attempting to steal from a Stellantis storage lot at the company's Jefferson North Plant in Detroit. The youngest was 11 years old. The kids were trying to steal Dodge Charger and Challenger Hellcat models, which would have been a daunting driving experience for the young, inexperienced drivers.

A 1967 Ford Mustang that spent its first few years in Vietnam has been auctioned for a large amount.

The green car was one of five built at Ford's Metuchen, New Jersey, factory that were shipped to South Vietnam that year. It was the only fastback in the bunch.

It was originally destined for Germany and stripped of the Mustang name so that it could be sold as a T-5 because Ford did not own the rights to "Mustang" in the country at the time.

Instead, it was purchased by the U.S. government for use by the head of the Navy Defense Contractors in Vietnam, according to Autoevolution.

It was equipped with a 289 cubic-inch V8 and a heavy-duty export suspension.

After two years, it was sold to a 98th division paratrooper named Ron Cain, who drove it in Vietnam for another two years. During that time, a River Rat decal was applied to rear window, the logo of the famed Mekong patrol.

Cain brought it back to Florida with him, and it stayed in the family until he sold it in the 1980s.

YouTuber Dennis Collins purchased it from that owner and offered it at a Worldwide Auctioneers of Auburn, Indiana, event last week, where it sold for \$145,600. All proceeds will go toward the J. Kruse Education Center Career Coaching Academy to provide scholarships for "veterans transitioning out of service into individually meaningful and purposeful careers."

Just under 13 feet long—weight, 1544 pounds, 400 to 700 pounds less than comparable models of popular imported sports jobs the Mustang is representative of the interesting design challenges at Ford Motor Company. Unique ways of reducing weight without sacrificing strength, to improve performance and economy, may stem from its design.

For example, seats are an integral part of the Mustang's body, adding structural rigidity. Brake, clutch and accelerator are mounted on a movable cluster which can be adjusted fore and aft (as can the steering wheel) to suit varying sizes of drivers.

Other important features: low-drag, aerodynamic shape proven in the wind tunnel; independent front and rear suspension; disc front brakes; roll bar built as an integral part of the body/frame structure; hot V-4 engine mounted forward of the rear axle in unit with a 4-speed manual transmission.

The Mustang is another example of how challenging assignments met by our engineers and stylists help Ford Motor Company maintain engineering leadership and provide new ideas for the American Road.
